

Year 1 Using Our Maths C Answers

Following Units 12-17

The more we can make maths part of everyday life for our children the better. So here are some problems for you to read to your child. Try making up your own too.

Remember at this stage to use lots of practical equipment, and not to write things down. Discuss with your child how they find each answer.

If we have 5 people for dinner and they each eat 2 sausages, how many are eaten all together? **10**

If there are 4 chairs around a table, how many chair legs do we have? **16**

Extend the counting games to include higher numbers e.g. steps walked to school, books on a library shelf, or children in class at school.

Using some of your children's toys make up a story e.g. if I start to build a house and use 13 bricks, then I need 20 more to finish it how many bricks will I have used? **33**

John is 6 years old and his brother Liam is 10 years old. How much older is Liam than John? **4 years**

If Smiths bookshop sold 19 comics and Tesco sold 16, who sold the most comics and how many more did they sell? **Smiths, 3 more**

Which of the following 2 numbers add up to 17? (10, 3, 7, 9) **10 and 7**
